National Garden Week is a special week when garden clubs are in the spotlight with activities that focus public attention on the role that garden club members have in their communities. This is done by planting trees or memorial gardens or by placing flower arrangements in public buildings. Civic beautification is an important part of the Shawangunk Garden Club, as it is with all garden clubs. The Shawangunk Garden Club, which centers around the Ellenville/Wawarsing area, has been active in the community since its inception in 1927.

According to Club president Dale Craft, the Club has given away 800 Kousa dogwood trees in the past three years. The Club purchased the trees and made them available to anyone in the community who would plant and nurture them.

In addition to this being a local plan, it was also the project of Phoebe Hunt, director of the Federated Garden Clubs Of New York, Inc. Mrs. Hunt honored the members of the Shawangunk Garden Club by planting a Kousa dogwood tree (photo above) at the "Point" of Main & Market Streets in Ellenville on June 11<sup>th</sup> to mark the local celebration of National Garden Week.

In preparation of the event, "The Point" was readied by having the sign moved forward with a stone-surround; mulch and several dozen perennials provided by the Village and planted and maintained by local volunteer help were attractively installed.
