Many of our community organizations will be participating with Blueberry goodies as a means of raising funds for group projects, so know that you are eating well for all the right reasons!

The street festival will be an array of craftspersons, artisans, vendors of quality merchandise... all proud of what they do. Many of our local civic organizations also participate with booths seeking your support and helping to make you aware just what it is that they offer our community. Our *Ellenville Regional Hospital* participates by putting together a **Health Fair** – and this year the wildly-fun Dunking Booth will be dedicated to the *Save Our Hospital Fund*. (Dunkees are still being recruited. Any volunteers for a truly great cause please call me!)

And, yes the *African American Men's Association* will again be serving up their BBQ chicken, ribs, brisket and corn on the cob; the *United Methodist Church* will be serving their famous sausage & peppers; Gary & Terry of *Lighthouse Deli* will be doing our Chamber Dogs; and, new this year, *Aroma Thyme Bistro* promises us some culinary surprises. This is only a sampling of what you can expect for the day – *Blueberry Festival* food is good!

And, of course, the music. **Liberty Square** will offer a place for your dancing shoes or just a place to "sit and relax for a few." Music adds to the spirit and makes it all fun.
