## From the Editor



"There is no way to Peace... Peace IS the way." — A.J. Muste

On a gorgeous, bright September 12<sup>th</sup>, dozens of persons, including guests representing foreign lands and faiths, gathered at the **Stone Church** in Cragsmoor to plant a Peace Pole and partake in an interfaith Celebration of Peace and Hope. Following are edited remarks by event organizer Maureen Radl of Cragsmoor, speaking at the ceremonies:

"It is with a joyous heart that I welcome you all here today on behalf of the *Friends of the Stone Church*. The shining faces of so many who have celebrated peace and hope with us in the past, is a testament to the need for this event to continue. But the sight of so many new faces shows that our ranks are growing, and that is important. For we are part of the armies of peace that are rising up in every country to pray and sing and drum our message of love into every corner of this troubled planet. We must never lose faith that peace is achievable. For no matter how dark the future may look, as long as we persist, as long as we hold on to the vision, someday, perhaps even in our lifetimes, peace *will* prevail on earth.

"Some of you are familiar with how this event first came into being, but for those of you who don't know, it bears repeating. On the first Sunday after 9/11, we held an impromptu memorial service for the victims of that tragedy. We had been unable to reach many of our friends in the city all week, but at that service we were all united, a group of sorrowful and distressed but none the less enlightened people. Many of you spoke with great eloquence and deep emotion about your experiences near the site and your reactions to what had happened. If my memory serves me well, there was not one who did not pray that those events would not lead to even greater acts of violence worldwide.

"I guess you all know the rest of the story. Our prayers have not yet been answered because as part of the human race we have not yet found a way to resolve differences peacefully. So each year on the Sunday closest to 9/11, we convene again, to search for a way to restore peace in our lives and in the world. Our interfaith service has drawn upon the wisdom of diverse spiritual traditions to pray for the peaceful evolution of humankind.

"When we come together for this celebration we recognize the bond we have as people. If we could dissolve colors, shapes, forms, and languages, then we could see all of ourselves as creatures, sharing the extraordinary universe that the Creator has designed for us. During the past few years there has been much pain, sadness, suffering, and loss among people everywhere, even in our country, in our community, and in our personal lives. But in a spiritual gathering like this, we hope to find peace and joy for the souls that have been burned in the fire of the world. And when we access the peace in our own hearts and acknowledge that there is peace in everyone, then we can share that peace in other places.

"Let us work toward world peace by honoring the earth, honoring its people, and celebrating the unity of the human spirit."
