The instrumental side of the concert was no less successful. Once again the Symphonic Band and Jazz Band showed great rapport with their director, Laurie Worden. A good barometer of their desire to play well revealed that they had increased in number by a third in the larger band. Word does get around, even in school, when you're having fun. Selections from Broadway plays, and the movie "Fellowship of the Rings" rounded out their performance. The jazz band concluded the evening with songs like "Crazy Train" and "Spies R Us." I could have listened to more from each group... they were that good. The brass sections were good, as were the woodwinds, and percussion and rhythm areas. True to tradition, a free make-your-own-ice-cream-sundae compliments of *Gillette Creamery* concluded the evening.

The entire tenor of the evening was upbeat. You came away proud of the conduct of the students, the almost flawless performances, the smiles on the faces of the audience, and the word confirming that this indeed was a memorable evening.
